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I'm wondering how many families or groups of friends reflect on the Sunday school lesson following Sunday morning; what has been said and just as important, what has been heard.

A family was having a discussion at lunch following Sunday school and worship. The young son told his parents his Sunday school teacher had threatened to throw him into the furnace. When the disturbed parents asked him how that happened, the child explained that his teacher had told him that if he missed three Sundays in a row, she would drop him from the register!

Sometimes the words we speak are not heard as we intend. A word which might seem benign of alternative meaning, may have baggage connected with it for another person.

I was 10 or 11 years old the first time I got hammered. I was sitting quietly at my desk in the one-room schoolhouse. The teacher walked by me and hit me in the head with a hammer. She called it a love pat. It didn't feel like love, and consider it a blessing I was never again hit with a hammer.

A mother said to her three-year old child, "If you don't learn your colors, you are going to be in special education." The child proudly told her aunt, "Mom says I'm going to have 'special' education."

I once used the story, "The Fourth Wise Man" by Henry van Dyke, Jr. as a sermon illustration, thinking that I clearly identified it as a story. Later that week, I received a phone call from a concerned church member who told me she had searched the gospels and could not find where it mentioned four wise men. (The gospels also don't mention three wise men.)

We were given the gift of speech—the gift can be used as a blessing or a curse. Like the choice given to the Israelites as they prepared to enter in the promised land, we are given the choice as to how we will use the gift. We were given voice to help us be in relationship with each other. We were also given hearing because one without the other often leads to misunderstanding.

Healthy relationships have healthy communication. We are all worth the time and energy necessary to help health happen. We are taught that when we teach that a gracious loving God is always ready to listen.

This last month had several things happen around the church.

The project to convert the lighting to LED usage is mostly completed. Throughout the entire church, there has been replacement of either the bulb or the fixture and bulb. The goal was to have the visible light be like the existing light but with the energy efficient LED lighting.

For those of you who have been at a worship service since the project has been completed in the sanctuary, it was probably a nice surprise to see the increase in lighting throughout the room. It highlights how beautiful our sanctuary is since there were many lights burned out previously. The entire project will enable us to get some Focus on Energy rebates.

Also, the Galena Street entrance remodel has made some progress in that the insulation and carpet has been removed from the area. The area has been fully insulated with a new product. Next will be the new drywall on the ceiling and then on to the painting and finish carpentry.

Still a part of the remodeling project are the exterior overhand areas. They will be enhanced some and provide more protection from the weather.

GIVING

The Work of God is Done By Giving

*The work of God is to be done by the people of God giving according to the will of God.
 Sutherland & Nowery, The 33 Laws of Stewardship.)*

This is as good a definition of Stewardship as there is. Whenever there is something to be done in the Kingdom of God, the followers of God are the ones who are called to do it. This may be leading prayers, meeting in small groups, working in the community garden, balancing the church's books, inviting our neighbors to worship, visiting shut-ins, or serving the poor.

We do much of this work of God through or supported by our local churches. Worship is the most visible, perhaps, but many other activities are equally important, such as spiritual formation, congregational care, hospitality and outreach, or missions. Moreover, the local churches support the works of the conference and denomination, as well. In Wisconsin, this includes ministries like congregational revitalization and new church starts, or health and welfare ministries and, elsewhere, ministries such as Africa University.

Without the people of God giving according to the will of God, none of these things would be happening. Sometime in the coming year, and for most of us, this fall, we will be called upon as God's people to give generously to support financially God's work in our local churches and beyond. This is a recurring call to discipleship that we all share through our connection in the Wisconsin Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Letter from the Bishop-Calling for Unity

John 17 reads: "May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one - I in them and you in me - so that they may be brought to complete unity. Then the world will know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me."

Like our Annual Conference theme indicates, we are One with Christ. While there are those that believe our Church should divide based on differences in biblical interpretation, I pray for the unity. Too often as United Methodists we define ourselves by what we are against—we stand against war and terrorism, against bullying, against police brutality—yes, we are against those things, but this kind of thinking sometimes causes us to lose sight of what we are for. United Methodists are for following Jesus Christ as disciples; we are for love and peace, for justice, for diversity and equality. We are for reconciliation and restoration, for harmony and unity. Now is a crucial time for United Methodists to communicate what we are for.

I do not expect that we will never agree on every point of theological reflection or understanding of our doctrine and polity. I do not ask anyone to accept a way of thinking or behaving that they believe deep in their heart is wrong. What I do ask – and I believe this to be the will of God – is that we accept each other. Does this mean that we will accept flawed human beings? Yes. Does this mean that we will forgive beyond measure or reason? Yes. Does this mean that we will celebrate each brother and sister as a gift from God? Yes. Will this be easy? No, not always. But our faith is never about being easy. To be Christian is to "seek to do good to one another and to all."

We are more than debates and divisions; more than rules and resolutions. As brothers and sisters in Christ who are uniquely made by God, we are called to serve as one body; to be one with Christ—we are stronger, better, and healthier, when we combine our efforts, gifts and talents, and act as one. My prayer is for unity in the Church for the advancement of our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world; and I invite all of you to pray for unity, along with the Commission for a Way Forward and the Council of Bishops.

One of the ways the Nurture Committee wants to care for our church family is to provide an outlet to share when one of us has a need, or when one of us has a need to help. It gives our church family an option to help out.

Here are some ideas for when it might be nice to have help:

- ◆ a painting project (It's always more fun to do with others!)
- ◆ technical assistance with a project
- ◆ going to a movie or out to dinner

Our goal is to help people ask for what they need thereby giving all of us an opportunity to help. I know there is so much that we receive when helping someone, not just when getting help—although both are nice! We are hoping it nurtures our congregation and brings our members a little closer in the process.

The "Helping Hands" sign is on the kiosk in the Galena entrance. Write down your need and stick it on the board. Life is more enjoyable and has more meaning as we share our struggles and our joys!
