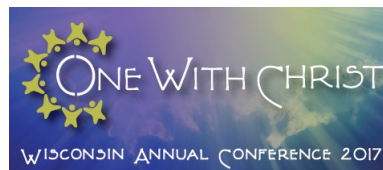

## Trustee's Report

By the time you read this you probably will have seen that the entry to the church on the Galena Street side has been receiving some attention and the ceiling tiles have been removed. This is the first step towards replacing them with drywall and then a finish look with some oak coffer strips. The rest of the interior entrance will receive some new light fixtures, paint and carpeting. This has been quite a while in the making but hopefully the finished look will be worth the wait.

Part of the ongoing effort to refresh our building includes the new base board trim in the Fellowship Hall to match the appearance of the new doors.

Also, underway is the change out of several light fixtures and bulbs throughout the entire church, Sunday school area and Fellowship Hall with new lighting. This is a move to be more efficient with LED lighting which is more efficient in regard to energy usage. This will be ongoing over the next few weeks.

As the remodel project continues over the next few weeks the exterior two entrances on Galena Street will have new overhangs created to be more protective from the elements and to freshen up the appearance.

The committee is active and will welcome your ideas and input so feel welcome to be in conversation with any of the committee.

## Letter from the Bishop—A House Divided

In 1858, Abraham Lincoln stated that "A house divided against itself cannot stand," referencing, of course, Jesus' teaching in Matthew 12. This is not a new concept, and for Christians it should be a central belief as we look at our world, our country, our own church, and such tragedies as the violence in Charlottesville, Virginia. Our divisions threaten to destroy us.

There is a very simple, yet important question that every United Methodist should be wrestling with: are those things that divide us greater than the God who unites us? Where does the power lie? Can we honestly call ourselves a people of faith when we act and speak as if our differences are greater than the one who creates us, redeems us, and sustains us?

What purpose is served by self-righteousness? What possible good can come from prejudices and biases and hostility? There is a very fine line between righteous indignation and downright hatred. In a world where ideologies clash, and result in violence and murder, the Church absolutely must proclaim a witness of peace and restoration. The Church provides us with a vision of God's will, and proposes that we might be one. One in Christ. One with each other. One in ministry to all the world. One baptism, one Lord, one Spirit, one God. There is simply no place for divisions to destroy us when we are the children of God, who is greater than any and all of our differences.

Once again, we must be a people of prayer who set aside differences and divisions to unite around the love and grace that transforms the world. We can LEAD in a world that is lost, and locked into a spiral of violence, contempt and condescension. Let us commit to be light in darkness, hope in despair, and healing in brokenness. 9/17 The Bridge of Service: Feed My Sheep, Rev. Ann Scott (1 Peter 4:8-11, John 21:15-19) Some people are given eyes and ears and heart to see those who are struggling with doubt and fears. They have the gift of 'helps' which connect us as servants and disciples of Jesus.

9/24 The Bridge of Mercy: Forgiven!

From generation to generation we need and abundance of mercy. We need compassion in a critical world that tells us we are not enough. We are made one In Christ Jesus.

10/1 The Bridge of Wisdom: 'Train a Child Up (Proverbs 22:6, 17-21, Luke 2:41-52)

Wisdom is needed to find the right way in the midst of a variety of choices. From generation to generation, wisdom helps Christians and culture to choose that which is life-giving. God is wisdom from whom our spirits grow.

10/8 The Bridge of Welcome: This Is My Child ((Galatians 3:25-29, John 3:13-17)

We love as we have been loved. We welcome as we have been welcomed. As our homes are a sanctuary with the embraces of family, in our church home we find a safe and warm place when we seek healing and rest.

Treasurer's Report (Gina Accola): A treasurer's report for June 2017 was handed out. (Noted on the handout: General checking account receipts for June \$14,577.61; Capital Improvement account \$134,588.63; report approved.

Finance (Pat Yanke) The annual report was completed and submitted. Also a brief audit summary from Court was passed out. Projections for this year year to date actual end of June \$85,000; budget for year \$199,000. Short of revenue about \$15,000. Total expense year to date \$91,000. Net short fall \$5,920 from actual projected budget.

Memorials (Jane Cordero for Louise Enge):

David Hein scholarship fund has been depleted and closed.

Designated funds: New stage curtain to be installed in early fall. Kitchen privacy curtains have been selected, on hold pending possible plans to replace countertops. Kitchen improvements i.e. countertop replacement, dishwasher installation, bunn-type coffee maker have been put on hold pending additional information.

Undesignated funds: Request by the youth director for a new basketball hoop in the church parking lot, approved and is being funded through a private donation to memorial funds. Additional suggestions for use of undesignated memorial funds are being received by the committee for prioritization and consideration.

Staff/Parish Relations (Gina Accola): report only

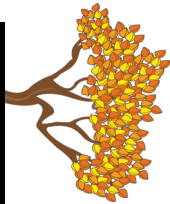
Lay Leadership (Pastor Doris):
